Bring on April showers for the May flowers Only a God of great wisdom could have created plants of such great beauty



One of the wonders of the modern world is the technology in our cell phones, laptops, personal computers, televisions and other mobile devices.

One of the curses of the modern world is that same technology increases our screen time, but reduces our Mother Nature time.

Translate: When is the last time you spent quality time with a real flower? But why bother stepping outside to your window sill or perhaps to a special table or desk to see the real McCoy when you can conjure them up instantly on your computer, laptop or smart phone?

Oh, c'mon! It's nowhere near the same experience or same thrill. But let's admit it: Artificial flowers have steadily crept into our lives and replaced live ones. Even in church.

Why? Well, they are much more realistic looking and can keep their shape and lustre far longer than real flowers. After all, who wants to keep changing the water for live plants or picking up the messy floral detris or dead leaves?

It is much cheaper to have artificial flowers that you buy once and perhaps clean every year or so.

Finally, in an era of rising hay fever and other allergies, who's going to sneeze or get a runny nose next to a silk gladiola or chrysanthemum? Flowers have been important in my life for three main periods: My childhood and my mom's love of flowers; my two years of study at Connecticut College that included plant taxonomy and botany; my 15 years with my former partner, Art.

Before I lead you down the garden path, let's look at some well-known Bible verses about flowers.

"The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever." – Isaiah 40:8

Or how about Matthew 6:28: "And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these."

And finally 1st Peter 1:24 : *"All flesh is like grass and all its glory like the flower of grass. The grass withers; the flower wilts."*

If Nature is God's first Bible, what three lessons do we learn from those Scripture verses?

Well, the Isaiah contrasts the everlasting nature of God's word with the temporal substance of stalks of grass and flowers.

The Mattew text asks if God clothes the lilies of the field, will not our Lord take greater care of us? Those are words of assurance. So, now the tale of how flowers played a role in my life at an early age. I grew up on a four-acre retired farm – it was always a small affair with two acres of mowed grass that doubled as a golf course for dad.

While my dad tried his hand at vegetables – he had a black thumb – mom had great success with irises, Rose of Sharon, periwinkle, asters, portulaca, hollyhocks and salvia.

By 1970, I was a Human Ecology major at New London-based Connecticut College, which has a greenhouse.

One section had orchids; you could watch the winter snowflakes melting on the glass while ensconced in the steamy, tropical heat inside.

Twenty years later, my former partner and I back-dated a large, 1915 center-hall Colonial into a mid-19th century Victorian mini-mansion.

We went crazy with gladiola, Kansas gayfeather, daisies, day lilies, petunias, purple cone flowers, salvia, lilacs, lily of the valley, daffodils, roses, tulips and my favorites: giant peonies.

Soon, the sanctuary will be filled with flowers for Easter. Let them remind you to spend time this Spring with the outside varieties in God's garden. *Blessings, Pastor Tom Interim Pastor*

Greetings Churches of Penn Central Conference,

During conversations with churches and clergy around the conference, we have heard that many are looking for more information about connecting with technology as well as meeting safely in person. Here are some testimonies from clergy around the conference during our monthly Coffee With The Conference Staff meeting in early March. Here is an abridged version of what some pastors and churches are doing.

Pastor Tim Hogan of St. Paul's/UCC in West Milton shared that his reopening committee surveyed the congregation regarding re-opening. With 75 percent of members ready to re-gather and a large percentage already vaccinated, St. Paul's UCC has decided to install a PlasmaAir air-filtration system.

Rev. Dr. Chris Rankin at Trinity UCC/East Petersburg has installed a bipolar ionization air-purification system and shortened its services. They gather in two services each Sunday.

Rev. Dani Neff at Mt. Zion/UCC in York is using the CDC's designation for community spread as a metric for when they will regather in the sanctuary. They will look to re-gather in the sanctuary when York County moves from high community transmission category to substantial.

All three leaders shared that their online (or phone) presence continues and will do so after re-gathering. *Zoom, Google Meet, Free Conference Calls*, and so many other tools are being used.

Leadership Team Update

The Leadership Team met on March 11, 2021 for its regular monthly meeting. After our opening activities, we continued our ongoing discussion about possible grants and obtaining 501c3 status for Redeemer. In order to access many of the available grants, Redeemer would need to obtain 501c3 status. This process can take a year. Jan, George, and Jorja will start gathering the requirements for this process to get us started and see if there are costs involved. If we do eventually apply for grants, it would be helpful to have ideas of specific grants we are interested in to narrow down the scope.

Jonathan presented the monthly Treasurer's Report. He also discussed changes that the officers/emeritus propose to update Redeemer's financial processes and offer more support to the Treasurer Roll. The first recommendation is to begin outsourcing all payroll functions to a third party firm, Sonrise Paymasters. The cost for this service would be approximately \$1,150 per year, and would eliminate the need for us to pay for Quickbook updates, which currently costs us \$700 per year. This would impact us with a net increase of \$450 per year for the payroll outsourcing. The plan would be to begin using the third party service in July 2021, 3rd quarter.

The second recommendation is to implement a new accounting package, IconCMO, which will combine our offering/membership system and finance/bill paying systems together. This is a cloud based church management system, which will allow the data to be accessed from anywhere. This gives the Treasurer the ability to work on these items from home or church as necessary. All the officers/emeritus will learn to use the system, so that there is support if the Treasurer needs to take time off. Our office administrator will also have access to portions of the program as necessary. This package will eliminate the need for our current software programs, Quickbooks and Servantkeeper. The cost of this new package is approximately \$385 per year, or \$35 per month. The recommendation is to install the package by June, and transition to full use by January 2022. This will make things more efficient for us to prepare for an audit in 2022, at which time we will decide if we should begin with an internal or an external audit.

The Leadership Team unanimously voted to accept these improvements to Redeemer's financial processes.

The current schedule of recording weekly video worship services is not sustainable for the Interim Pastor, Music Director, and Leadership Team Chair. We will continue recording videos through Easter. After Easter, we will move to a more pastor-centered outreach, which will possibly utilize weekly devotionals instead of videos, or may re-use the year's worth of videos we've created in the past year. The Leadership Team unanimously voted to accept this change.

Pastor Tom presented his report, and we reviewed Jorja's written office administration report. New business included the proposal to investigate installing an AED (defibrillator) device. Mike will research the requirements and costs associated with this idea. The rest of the meeting consisted of the Leadership Team and Interim Pastor discussing ongoing communication challenges. Dr. Marisa Laviola from the conference joined us in person to offer guidance for this discussion. Pastor Tom also invited a consultant, Bruce Conrad, to observe the meeting. The purpose of this meeting was to share openly how we can work together to accomplish the work of the church in the best interest of the Leadership Team, the congregation, and the Interim Pastor.

In a separate meeting, the Search Committee presented their unanimous recommendation to the Leadership Team to call a settled pastor. This recommendation was accepted with a unanimous vote by the Leadership Team. More information on this process will be featured in a separate newsletter article. Our next regularly scheduled Leadership Team meeting will be held on Thursday, April 8, 2021 at 7pm. As always, please reach out to the Leadership Team if you have any questions, comments, or concerns.







Redeemer Extends Call to a Settled Pastor

In a unanimous decision by the Search Committee and the Leadership Team, Redeemer has extended a call to a settled pastor. Please join us for Call Sunday on Sunday, April 11, to meet the candidate. Call Sunday is the day when our candidate will lead worship at Redeemer.

Following worship, all Redeemer members will participate in an anonymous vote by paper ballot. In order for our candidate to become our settled pastor, there must be a two-thirds "yes" vote by all members that are present at Call Sunday. If the vote passes, the candidate and representatives from Redeemer and the Conference will sign the covenantal call document, and our settled pastor will begin her ministry with us in June.

The Search Committee had the opportunity to meet with the candidate three times, twice by zoom and once in person. We were also able to view some of her worship services online. We like her calm energy, her deep faith, and the way she answered all of our questions with thoughtfulness, humility and grace. She is artistic, with a background in science, and she likes our labyrinth. Her worship incorporates a mix of traditional and modern elements. She practices self-care to make sure she doesn't take on too much, and she also respects that those she works with need to have down time and practice self-care as well. We think the candidate will be a very good match for us at Redeemer.

We want to acknowledge both the Profile and Search Committees for their diligent work during this process and the congregation for their patience in navigating this important step for our church.

Beef & Dumplings Submitted by Jorja Barton

2 Tb. olive oil 2 lb. lean beef cubes dredged in ¼ c. flour 2 large onions thinly sliced (about 3 cups) 3 cloves garlic, minced 3 Tb. brown sugar 2-10 oz cans of Beef broth 1 tsp. Thyme 1 tsp. Paprika ½ c. Parsley

2 bottles of beer 4 Tb. wine vinegar Salt and Pepper to taste

Directions: Heat oven to 325°. Using Dutch Oven, saute sliced onions and garlic in oil until translucent. Add dredged beef cubes and brown over medium heat. Add all remaining ingredients and bring to simmer. Cover and place in preheated oven for 2 hours then remove to stove top. (In 1 ¾ hours, prepare dumpling mixture.)

Dumplings: Mix 2 cups of Bisquick (or Jiffy Mix) with one cup of milk. Place serving spoon sized dollops of dough on top of the beef mixture, cover and cook on low for 10 minutes. Do not peek! The steam in the pot cooks the dumplings. After 10 minutes, remove from the heat and serve! I serve the dumplings in one dish and the beef in another.

This "easy but gourmet" recipe has been a favorite of our family for more than 40 years. A friend who loved to cook first made it for my husband and me probably back in 1974 following a vacation he took to Historic Williamsburg. He claimed the recipe dates back to Colonial Times, so it's far more than just my family's favorite. The beef is incredibly tender, the gravy scrumptious, and the dumplings are light as clouds. I hope this becomes a favorite of yours too! Bon Appétit!


