What if we pray to be 'a better person' in 2021?

Let's ask God's help for our New Year's resolutions for the coming year

"God, create a pure heart in me and make my spirit strong again. Don't withdraw or take away your Holy Spirit from me." Ps 51: 10-11

The only thing tougher than trying to make New Year's resolutions is having to read others' advice on how to do it.

Now that I have shared one of my pet peeves, allow me, please, to give you some advice on how to do it!

(That was sneaky of me, huh?) Well, here is my advice re making resolutions: Don't.

As in don't try it yourself. As in don't try it yourself, but instead, invite God into the process.

For starters, God knows you better than you know yourself. Trust me; it's true.

That means God will likely have a better idea of what you can reasonably handle and accomplish.

More importantly, God can set priorities for us better than we can. Translate: What's important!

Yes, I know most of you resist that idea, but God knows best! Since God rarely texts, emails or gets on Twitter (let's not rule it out completely), you need some alternative mode of communication for communing. Something decidedly low-tech, simple but extremely effective. Yup, prayer! But try generic prayers, instead of specific ones. How does that work?

Well, instead of praying to lose 10 pounds, pray for better overall health and reflect on suggestions gleaned from discernment.

If you listen carefully and patiently, I believe God will provide you with some surprising insights or alternate guidance.

About 30 years ago, I had low back pain not connected to a skeletal issue. My lower back was so tight around 1994, for example, that I took three sick days off over a 10 day work period. And I hurt!

I read all the articles about how to handle back pain – I think there were as many theories as vertebrae (33 if you are curious) in the human back!

Instead of praying "God, please heal my back pain," I asked God to help me figure out what was causing my back pain.

I finally made a connection between interpersonal conflict with another editor at work and my lower back pain.

When I arrived one day to receive a scowl to my "good morning," I felt a tinge of pain. My back got tighter when I saw him. Hmm. I prayed for insights and realized I had not expressed appreciation for his help in the past.



When I shared my gratitude, his attitude changed and we worked better together. My pain eased.

We were never going to be good friends, but we had an improved work relationship.

Let's be honest. It's easy to pray for things that require other folks to change or respond differently. Resist that temptation and instead ask God to make shifts and changes in how you hear, interpret and handle things.

Example: My persistence can feel like pushiness. Yikes! Yes, I want the best for Redeemer and the church universal, but I can relax some and trust more.

That is a New Year's resolution. I'm also praying to be as kind, thoughtful and flexible as our leadership chair, music director and office administrator.

Their overall graciousness to me is inspiring – even when I make mistakes or fall short.

So start praying and await God's help for your New Year's resolutions. Happy New Year!

PENN CENTRAL CONFERENCE

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The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. (John 1:14a)

Years ago at my ordination exam I was questioned about my perspectives on the cross and resurrection and how important they were to my own experience of faith. I don't remember my exact answer. But I do remember that it was short – because I went on to say that for me, the incarnation of Jesus had just as much impact on my faith and I felt it wasn't discussed often enough. The power behind the idea that God came to dwell within human flesh is staggering. The idea that the Creator of the Universe (and my own Creator) somehow joined with our humanity was transformative for me.

The Christmas story is a beautiful one and it is responsible for some of the best music, writing and art in the world. The story has elements that please all audiences. The image is captivating: a seemingly mess-free birth occurs in a stable with soft-eyed donkeys looking on, there are angels outfitted in gold and glitter, and shepherds on hillsides with sheep look up at a star that burns brightly. There is hope and promise and glory. After the visit with three men in gorgeous robes, the family flees away from Herod. And our liturgical year moves on.

As a child I loved the story. As an adult I revere the message – and I spend a great deal of time thinking about what it means for God to dwell in an actual person. The power of the miracle has to do with the inherent messiness of human flesh. If God chose to "make a tabernacle" within a human, then that means our lives – our very bodies - can be holy and good and beautiful. As a woman raised in middle-class American culture I learned through advertising and the media that my physical self was certainly not beautiful. Not according to what "they" depicted. For many, the experience of trauma to our bodies reinforces this – beauty and goodness of the physical self are buried under shame and self-loathing. And we easily slide from "not beautiful enough" to "not good enough" and back again. Those messages, over so many years, wear deep grooves into how we think about ourselves. I know this because when I ask clergy what voices they hear in their heads, the most common one says, "I am not good enough."

The incarnation burns away our meager cultural notions of what is beautiful and good and demonstrates that the Creator favors our living selves – our whole selves – for a dwelling place. Mary carried the Word-made-flesh in her own imperfect, young, vulnerable body. The physical body is indeed good enough - to house our savior and to house the Spirit of the Lord. The body we often reject is loved and made holy in our faith. This is the miracle of Christmas to me: Mary carries God-with-us in her womb and makes a sanctuary of her body. Redemption is not only for our hearts and minds – it is also for our physical selves. Thanks be to God.



Alcohol Abuse and Covid-19 Redeemer's Commitment to Support Groups

An editorial in the British Medical Journal gave a stark warning that we should all prepare to deal with the gigantic costs of the pandemic's long term social isolation and loss of employment, which will include alcohol and drug abuse, domestic violence, and other social problems.

"The toll of increased alcohol harm will be felt for a generation." Write authors Lora Finlay, chair of Commission on Alcohol Harms, and Ian Gilmore, chair of Alcohol Health Alliance U.K. "Our Health system must be prepared for a surge in the need for alcohol treatment services." The researchers identified two groups who will need attention from the medical community and "AA. "The first is those already struggling with alcohol dependence," they wrote. "Many support organizations moved services online with impressive speed, but the new format leaves others falling through the gap. The second group is those on the brink of dependence during lockdown and beyond. For them, dependence will be triggered by bereavement, job insecurity or troubled relationships".

In recognition of the fragility of many who experience addiction, throughout the epidemic Redeemer continued to accommodate our support group building partners by providing meeting space both indoors and outdoors. Time and time again, meeting participants reach out to the office with words of thanks and appreciation for this ongoing support.
