Halloween and Christianity by Pastor Christina

Out of the four seasons, I love Fall the best. I especially love October. It has the perfect combination of Fall weather, in-season apples, trees turning into a brilliant display of color, crunchy leaves, Halloween, and my birthday right in the middle of it all. Yes, I was born on Friday the 13th in October – it's like I was meant to love Halloween.




Growing up, the only thing I didn't like about Halloween was the plastic masks. There was a tiny open space for your mouth, and maybe some nose holes – it got hot and gross underneath, and if you wore glasses like me, they fogged up and you couldn't see out of the eye holes.



Where I grew up, there were city kids, development kids, and country kids. City kids and development kids could walk out their front doors and go trick-or-treating free of parents.

country kids had to have a parent (usually Mom) drive us to the nearest development.

Where I went, every house had a light on and candy at the ready. Except one – a family that firmly believed that Halloween was pagan and should not be observed by Christians.



Later in life, I became a Pagan, and learned how different American Halloween is from the Pagan holiday Samhain. Then I returned to Christianity, into a church that vehemently opposed the observance of Halloween. Times had changed from when I was a kid. Most churches where I lived had "Trunk-or-Treat," and instead of going house-to-house, kids safely walked from car to car in the parking lot. Different churches had different rules about costumes and decorations. For some, it was regular Halloween, just done in a concentrated area with known people. Where I went, it was an anti-Halloween event, where the trunks were decorated as favorite Bible

stories, and costumes were limited to pretty princesses for girls, and rugged soldiers for boys.

One of the things I took with me from Paganism is that intent matters. If your intent is to celebrate the end of harvest, the beginning of winter, and the ability to interact with the dead, well, then you're treading into Pagan territory. If it's all about the fun of coming up with a creative costume and getting candy, well, that's American Halloween, not Pagan Samhain.

This month, Halloween falls on a Sunday. October 31st is a significant day in Protestant Christianity because it is Reformation Day. Out of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation came the saving "Reformed, and always Reforming." If we stop changing, the church never grows and thrives. The United Church of Christ was born out of a period of ecumenism that saw many denominations merging and creating new identities. What can we do to celebrate the growth of the Church? I'm a fan of JOY. Let us be joyful this month and come to church on October 31st in the red of Reformation Sunday AND the costumes of Halloween. Keep an eye out during the month for hints about what my costume will be.

Empowering the church to demonstrate and declare the courageous love of Christ!

This past Saturday my family participated in a mission day at Wittle Farm with a group from our church, Christ UCC in Elizabethtown. We harvested hundreds of pounds of bell peppers, jalapenos, and potatoes. One group rebuilt a 90-year-old wagon while others took down some trees that will be chipped in to mulch on our next service day. We also cleaned a large corner of the barn in order to prepare for the new walk-in refrigerator installation.



Wittle Farm is part of the **Lutheran Camping Corporation** with whom Penn Central Conference has a partnership to provide outdoor ministry opportunities throughout the conference. Christ Church designated Wittel Farm for their Vacation Thank Offering this summer and in addition to financial gifts (some of which bought a cultivator tractor), members harvested hundreds of pounds of produce that was donated to local food banks, planted spring and fall crops, tended the pollinator garden, completed a number of farm projects and collected almost 800 pounds of compost.

Steve Stouffer, Consistory
President and member of the
Mission Team said, "When the
idea (of partnering with Wittle
Farm) was raised back in the early
spring it seemed like a 'no
brainer'. It was local. It was
needed. It was something we are

equipped to do with many members who can build (just about anything) and are hard workers who don't mind getting their hands and shoes dirty!"

Associate Pastor Fa Lane noted,
"We are grateful that Wittel Farm
has opened up this ministry
opportunity for Christ Church who
has a three-year mission
structure: local, national,
international. Because of this
alliance, Christ Church was able to
do local mission this year! It
started from a contact with our
Green Team to encourage local
gardening and fresh produce to
address food insecurity. Then the
mission team decided to sign on
too!"

We all know what it's like to put a plan together and have it go astray when new Covid guidelines come along. "Because it's been outside, we have been able to plan and execute and follow-through without continual changes in response to Covid", added Steve.

Our Conference Minister mentioned church gardens at the annual meeting and reading about some of the growing projects, food donations and church gardens has been a real treat as some of you share stories with us about your local work. Is food insecurity or creation care a passion for your congregation? Think about ways that your church might look at land use policies to meet local needs or partner with other groups in doing so.

We are building a "how-to" session for starting church gardens, please let us know if you are interested in exploring this type of ministry at your church.

Leadership Team September Meeting Highlights

The Leadership Team met on September 9, 2021, for its regular monthly meeting. After our opening activities, Jonathan Bell presented the Treasurer's report and continued our working discussion of the 2022 budget. We began discussing ideas for fundraising, which will be discussed in more detail by the Stewardship Team.

Tom Bell presented estimates for Wi-Fi upgrades for the sanctuary. After much discussion of all the options, Leadership Team approved a plan to have Verizon add a second internet line with a router in the sanctuary. This option is very cost effective for Redeemer and will allow for a stronger internet connection in the sanctuary.

The Building Security/Access
Team met with Sergeant Clements
from Derry Township police for a
building security assessment. The
walk-through was informative and
gave us ideas for upgrading our
security throughout the building
and putting a security plan in place,
based on the police's "run, hide,
fight" strategy. The next step for
the Team is to invite a conference
disability/access specialist to walk

through the building and give us ideas to make the building more accessible for disabled and elderly folks who use the building.

The Pastoral Relations Committee met with Pastor Christina to begin open dialog on issues that affect the congregation. A few items that came up for discussion were to make sure volume levels of microphones are checked on Sunday mornings, and for Pastor Christina to give clear cues on when to stand and sit during worship. Worship with Pastor Christina is going very well and there is positive feedback. The Committee will meet quarterly to discuss any congregational and/or pastoral concerns.

Jan Stong met with Love, Inc. and shared information with Leadership Team about the "Loving Our Community" event that will take place from October 20-24. Items can be donated for auction.

In preparation for Jorja's leap into full retirement, Kira will work with Jorja to learn the ins and outs of the office during the transition between office managers. We are incredibly grateful for all Jorja has

done to bring organization to the office and keep things running smoothly!

Pastor Christina presented her Pastor's Report. She has been making her office more comfortable, and also participating in educational opportunities regarding sermon writing. Her Installation service will be planned soon.

The Hummelstown Arts Festival was a successful fundraiser for Redeemer. Beautiful, warm weather was perfect for selling ice cream! We are also looking forward to the Historical Society tours that will stop by Redeemer on Saturday, Sept. 25.

Hershey Food Bank begins on October 1 through November 21. Non-perishable food items will be accepted and displayed on the windowsills in the sanctuary. Items will be delivered to the Food Bank in time for its holiday distributions. Last year, our building use partners also participated in the drive to *fill the sills*, helping us to surpass previous drives. Audrey Baker will spearhead the project again this year and seeks volunteers to help gather donations and deliver them to the Food Bank in November. Let's try to surpass last year's drive of more than **390** pounds (312 meals*!) of non-perishable food! (*USDA meal = 1.2 lbs.)

Love INC fills the gap that many have with personal care items and paper goods that are not covered by SNAP (food stamps) and are sometimes difficult to access through local food and grocery donation and distribution programs.

As Love INC has needs for certain products that are in short supply from time to time, Jan thought to begin holding monthly drives to help to fill those gaps. This month's Recipe Corner features a great side dish, perfect as the weather begins to get a little colder. Our very own Lorna Davis says: "I got this recipe from a dear friend, and it has been a family favorite at Thanksgiving and Christmas. I usually have to make 2 of them and very little, if any, is leftover." Sounds and looks yummy, Lorna. Thank you!

Golden Cheddar Broccoli Bake

4 Tablespoons butter (divided in half)

2 Tablespoons flour

¼ teaspoon salt

1 ½ cups milk

1 ½ cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

34 cup cornflake crumbs (divided)

1-2 large heads of fresh broccoli, blanched (steam for 2-3 minutes) (can blanch ahead and freeze)



In a medium saucepan over medium heat, melt 2 Tbsp. butter; stir in flour and salt. Add milk gradually, mixing until smooth. Cook mixture until it boils, stirring constantly. Add cheese, stirring until melted. Mix in ¼ cup of corn flake crumbs. Remove from heat.

Arrange blanched broccoli in an 8 x 12-inch baking dish or I use a round Corning Ware quiche dish. Pour cheese sauce over broccoli.

Toss remaining ½ cup of cornflake crumbs with 2 Tbs. melted butter. Sprinkle this mixture over casserole. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

 mark the occasion.
- Please abide by local, state and CDC guidelines for health and safety.
- Tell your story on your own personal page. Record and post your own video, sharing why you are involved and challenging others to join you by donating and raising funds.
- Share your video on social media, tag your friends and potential donors.
- Connect to the why of walking. Bring your whole self, and spirit into this work!
- Pray or meditate each day leading up to the Walk.
- On your Walk Day, open with a prayer for the vulnerable and set aside time for quiet reflection or active excitement.
- As you Walk, safely fellowship with your group as you join in solidarity with others near and far.
- Post pictures of you and your team on social media and be sure to tag them with #VirtualCROPHungerWalk or #EndHungerNow.
